# One Year Advanced Training Programme in NARRATIVE PRACTICE (SEP 2025 – DEC 2026)

The **Department of Social Work** and its **Social Work Practice and Mental Health Centre** are delighted to announce that the new cohort of One-year Advanced Training Programme in Narrative Practice will be launched in **September 2025**. This Programme will continue to be organized in collaboration with the **Dulwich Centre, Australia**. The Programme will be conducted from September 2025 to December 2026.

## About the programme

The Programme is designed for those who have prior knowledge and practice of narrative ideas, and who are keen to develop their individual and collective practice in the local context. Participants must have a **bachelor degree** from a recognized university and **attended an introductory course on narrative therapy of at least 24 hours organized by the HKBU, local NGOs/professional organisations or its equivalence**. The Department will assess the introductory courses studied by Programme applicants to determine eligibility.

This Programme consists of **5 modules**, a total of **no less than 110 hours**. It will cover ten key conversation/practice maps of narrative therapy and consist of four areas of practice. Trainers who are International Faculty of the Dulwich Centre and local practitioners/teachers will be providing lectures, training workshops, practice sessions, tutorials and individual supervision. Training sessions delivered by local trainers will be conducted in both English and Chinese. Participants are also required to complete a reading and writing programme and to present a written project in which they apply narrative ideas in their own context.

## Award

Participants who have attended 85% of the sessions and completed all assignments and presentation of their project will be awarded a **certificate** by Dulwich Centre, Australia and Social Work Practice and Mental Health Centre, Hong Kong.

Graduates of this programme are eligible to apply for the **Master's Programme in Narrative Therapy and Community Work** (a collaboration between Dulwich Centre and Department of Social Work, University of Melbourne) with advanced standing equivalent to **25 points of the total 100 points**.

He has decades of experience in working in dozens of mental health services and voluntary organizations as well as an independent practitioner. He is currently working in independent practice as well as in Sydney at Uspace, a psychiatric unit for young people in St Vincent’s Hospital.

He is a member of the Dulwich Centre faculty, an Honorary Clinical Fellow at Melbourne University’s School of Social Work and a teacher in the Master’s Program in Narrative Therapy and Community Work of the University of Melbourne (a university accredited as one of the best in the world).

Recent teaching assignments have included Brazil, Nepal, Turkey, Hong Kong and Palestine. David is the author of many articles about Narrative Therapy including the influential “Rescuing the Said from the Saying of it: Living Documentation in Narrative Therapy.”

In his workshop on “Doing group and relationship therapy using narrative practices”, David Newman will be sharing his exploration of using narrative practices in these two realms. The workshop will be engaging mix of lectures - including some of the history of how narrative ideas have been used in the two realms we will be exploring, the sharing of stories, and the exploration of the ideas with exercises.
